We Return to Brazil's Bountiful Igapo Acu Fishery

One of the largest, most productive and most exciting peacock bass fisheries in the Amazon has essentially lain fallow for three years in a row. Starting with the unusually severe drought of 2005 and then followed by two years of failed negotiations with the resident tribal leaders, the Igapo Acu region of the Rio Madeira basin hasn't seen a fishing lure in quite some time. It's natural for anglers to expect a fishery to respond to such a long period of disuse by a measurable rise in productivity when they finally return. Well, it certainly did respond, but it went way beyond simply measurable. It went way beyond any of our expectations. We found ourselves in the midst of a gigantic protected reserve full of wild and aggressive peacocks. You can almost guess what happened next.

We caught enormous numbers of fish! We caught them on everything, jigs and plugs and stick baits and especially prop-baits. These peacocks were so aggressive

that they struck woodchoppers and riprollers and Caribe pavon props with total abandon. The only reason anglers might catch more on other baits was that it simply takes longer to unhook fish

from the big propeller lures. The amazing productivity and the sheer fun of catching hundreds of these wild predators each week made even experienced anglers giddy with excitement. The tremendous numbers of fish we landed during our stay in the region surprised even our most grizzled veteran peacock fishermen.

Our first group arrived to slightly high water levels that were dropping steadily, creating perfect fishing conditions. Eight anglers combined for a total of 2,349 peacocks during the week, with plenty of big trophies landed - and plenty more lost! 21 peacocks over 10 pounds were weighed in. High hook for the week was the team of Steve Townson of Algarve, Portugal and Bruce Manalio of Paramus,

NJ with an amazing total of 630 peacock bass between them. Bruce also landed a 17 pound trophy, duplicating the achievement of Larry Zebroski of Toronto, Canada and Bruce Kievit of Little Falls, NJ. This group of anglers averaged almost 300 fish apiece. What a week! Could it possibly get better?

It did! The 2008 fall dry season has been very normal and predictable in the southern Amazon Basin. Coupled with a remarkably bountiful fishery, conditions were ripe for a repeat performance by our second group. They outdid themselves. The presence of a core cadre of seasoned peacock fishermen, together with the great conditions yielded a total of 3,796 peacock bass for the week. Ricky Newton of Republic, MO and Bill Southworth of Springfield, MO both landed 17 pound trophies, while the pair of Ricky Newton and Ed Giltner of Fair Grove, MO, destroyed any possible competition with a mindboggling total of 910 peacock bass for the week!

The season's third group of anglers aboard the Blackwater Explorer kept the momentum going. Worldwide Anglers David Horne of Beverly Hills, CA and Steve Tucker of Anchorage, AK landed a pack leading total of 616 fighting peacock bass. Steve Tucker and Andy Rockwell of Rio De Janeiro each landed 18 pound trophies, tying for the big fish of the week. The mixed

group of 13 men and women aboard the Blackwater Explorer combined for a grand total of 2,886 fish for the week.

Conditions in the Igapo Acu remained superb as water levels continued to drop rapidly. Our fourth group of fishermen feasted on trophy fish in an angler's dream tableau. Michael Miller of Alexan-

Igapo Acu groups for next season (as you might expect, many who were here have already re-booked).

dria, VA took the honors for biggest fish with a 22 pound lunker. Michael also combined with Dick Dahlke of Hickory Creek, TX to produce the highest total number of fish per boat with 771 peacocks landed for the week.

Our return to the Igapo Acu produced some of the best fishing we've encountered anywhere in quite a few years. The fish were wildly aggressive, the numbers were astounding and trophies were plentiful. We caught 11,599 peacocks! Every angler lucky enough to be part of our triumphant return to the Igapo Acu recognized that they had been privileged to enjoy the fishing trip of a lifetime.

The Igapo Acu has long been noted for its high numbers, good average size and the ever-looming presence of huge trophy peacocks. This vast Indian reservation is closed to commercial fishing and all other non-affiliated sportfishing operations. The Blackwater



New Exploratory Trip - Nov. 2009

We've Found Another Exciting New Variety River

Mark Drnec, a veteran peacock bass angler, contributed this first person report on our recent preliminary exploration of the Rio Pacu. He opted to join us even though we repeatedly warned him of the potential pitfalls of a first venture into a new fishery. He was well prepared to suffer discomfort camping in the forest, to suffer boredom parsing out logistics and to suffer fishing deprivation if the river was a bust. Happily, none of these things came to pass. Instead, we found a very comfortable little pousada that provided our lodging, we flew in, bypassing all the detailed logistics and we caught lots of great fish—the river turned out to be a real winner. Join us on our full-scale exploratory series in November, 2009 - only \$3250!

Our adventure on the Rio Pacu started with the plane ride in. We landed a Cessna on a little grass runway lying perpendicular to the river.



Nobody would think of landing a plane here, but we did. After being warned that I was going to camp in the woods and sleep on the ground, we were lucky enough get access to a 'pousada' that had been meant to be an eco-lodge built along the river. It was a quaint, but comfortable little place that can hold up to about 10 anglers. I ended up having a great place to call home for the trip. The food was surprisingly good - as I tend to be one of the worlds pickiest eaters. The many different types of fish and the local game we ate were all delicious.

We had four anglers fishing in two boats. Each boat had a native guide who knew the river like the back of his hand. We traversed many different rapids and never hit a rock! I was amazed! Ironically these people had never seen any artificial lures, or even a baitcaster, or spinning reel before. Our guide would throw out a hand line when we were anchored and in no time would have a fish on. It was humorous to watch him struggle with a big cat on that rig because he went into full conversation with the fish while he fought it, which took a very long time. I couldn't understand a word he said, but he got it into the boat.

We explored close to 60 miles up and down the river. Because we were committed to travel in October, before the normal low water season, the river was about 3 feet higher than optimal. Yet it provided plenty of great action anyway. We were able to locate lots of peacocks up to about 10 lbs. in small tributaries and braids off the main river. These were readily available whenever we wanted to



catch them. Meanwhile, the main river seemed to hold the really big fish.

One afternoon, Dave Caywood and I, after much sign language, took our guide's advice to use cut bait for Pirapitinga. It didn't take very long between piranha bites to hook up with an enormous 28 pounder. I thought sure this fish was going to break my rig. It took me a good 15 to 20 minutes to land the beast and having no net made it all the more fun. I could barely hold the fish up for a picture after the battle. Although it was my only Pirapitinga in the 3 days we fished, it was a beauty. The locals claimed that this was a small one for this river. Ha! I cannot imagine one getting twice as big.

I didn't spend a lot of time fishing for Payara, but I did manage to get a nice 7 pounder on a Yo-zuri. I had a few more payara chase various baits right up to the boat and take a swing and miss. Wellington Melo and Dave landed a few larger specimens that day. On our last morning before departing, we meandered through some backwaters above a nice series of rapids. We then walked for a good 20 minutes through the jungle and fished off of some rocks below the rapids. There, I watched Paul Reiss jump off a really nice payara. Because the water was a bit high and rough here, we hiked our way back to the boats. This was another cool looking place that is bound to hold some really big fish when Acute Angling returns to these waters next November.

In the late afternoons we would typically hit spots where our guide liked to catch surubim catfish. He sure knew what he was doing, since each time we hit a spot we were on the cats quickly. The flatheaded surubim is one of the coolest looking catfish I have ever seen. They don't reach the size of the jau, or some of the other giant cats, but they'll give you a serious fight, since they swim in open water and will reach over 50 pounds here. Our biggest surubim that made it to the boat weighed about 30 pounds. This river also holds the bigger giant catfish species and I would think some real beasts are waiting within its confines.

Catching a huge Pirapitinga was great, but the highlight of my trip was watching a jaguar swim across the river. Our guide spotted it in the middle and was able to get the boat to it quickly where I snapped off a few really cool pictures. This thing wasn't as happy to see me as I was him. Although it didn't last long, it was one of the neatest things I have ever seen. There is plenty of wildlife here. This area holds many of the same birds as other Amazon regions, but we also saw a lot of toucans. One afternoon, Paul and I were greeted by a snake that was knocked out of a tree as we bumped it while passing underneath. Although I didn't like the fact that it chose to slither across my feet to exit the boat, at least I didn't embarrass myself by jumping and screaming like a little girl. I was too scared to move at all!!

Under the lower water conditions that will occur in November, this place will offer fantastic fishing opportunities for many different species of fish. There is a lot of water here and a lot of variety within it. I can't wait to see what types and sizes of fish come out of here during the three full scale exploratory trips next November. 

AMAZON TIDBITS - NEWS FROM THE RIVER

Even more amazing than the amazing fishes of the Amazon, is the amount of rumor and gossip generated about it. This column will appear from time to time in an effort to report actual news before it evolves into wildly inexplicable fiction.

Blackwater Explorer Heading North - As the dry season progresses, our yacht has moved into the Rio Negro basin. We expect to be fishing several of the region's blackwater rivers during the next few months. Depending on conditions and government regulations, we foresee the Rio Urubaxi, the Jufari, the lower Caures and perhaps the Rio Unini. We, along with many others, are waiting for an as-yet-unrendered government decision regarding this fishery.

Mini-Exploratory - 2009 - Paul Reiss and Wellington Melo are heading to Brazil's northwestern Para state to explore another potential new variety fishery next fall, 2009. We're not sure what to expect here since there has been little information recorded regarding the waters above an almost-impassable waterfall on this river. As we did on the Rio Pacu (see page 4), we are likely to encounter a mix of peacocks, payara, pirapitinga, bicuda and giant catfish. We may be able to take 1 or 2 intrepid anglers with us. There will be no staff, no services and no guarantees. We'll share the work, risks and potential fishing rewards. If you're up for something like this, give us a call.

New Manaus Flight - Beginning after Jan 1st, 2009, Delta Airlines has scheduled a new daily flight from Atlanta, GA to Manaus, Brazil. Depending on your personal schedule and itinerary, this flight may be a good choice for your trip. Acute Angling is pleased to offer this flight, along with TAM's existing Miami to Manaus flight to all of our anglers. We welcome this new option and we expect that this suddenly competitive route, together with

recently dropping fuel prices will help to lower travel costs to Brazil.

The World Economy - Hardly a topic for optimistic conversation, recent economic factors have, however, made going peacock bass fishing a little bit easier for the angler. After five years of steady decline, the dollar has finally reversed its trend against Brazil's currency, the Real ... at least for now. This translates into a potentially more stable set of operating parameters for our trips and, at least temporarily, we plan to hold prices steady. We will therefore honor today's trip prices for all of next season's trips, as long as these currency conditions remain stable. If conditions change and we are forced to raise prices later this year, we will continue to honor prices for all bookings made and deposited prior to any renewed devaluations of the U.S. dollar.

That makes this today a great time to book your next trip. Lower airfares, last year's trip prices and our "early-bird special" pricing on the Blackwater Explorer's Igapo Acu trips all combine to create what we'd like to call an "economic fishing stimulus package". For many of us, this might be more meaningful than the one the U.S. government recently doled out.

Water Levels - Beginning with our Igapo Acu trips in the southern Amazon basin and continuing into our Blackwater Explorer trips in the Rio Negro tributaries, water levels have been exactly as expected so far this season. Fishing conditions have been extraordinarily good (see page 1 report) and look to continue that way. We're finally having a season free of the effects of 'El Nino and La Nina'. Take advantage of what is shaping up to be a great fishing season by booking one of our remaining trip spaces (see page 7).

Schedules - Beginning with this issue, we'll be starting our trip dates based on the day the air charter transfer takes you into the fishery and the day it takes you back out. Due to the new variability in ways to access Manaus, we think it will be more to the point if we tell you when you'll be leaving Manaus and when you can expect to return to Manaus, leaving you free to select which one of our travel options will work best for you.

NEW - Acute Angling Website Upgrade

Its been quite some time since we've updated our content laden Acute Angling website. Due partly to inertia and partly to the site's size and complexity, change has been a while in coming. As you read this, however, our website is undergoing a major upgrade. We haven't gone after fancy gimmicks or technology-heavy features, however. What we've concentrated on has been to improve the site's readability and to add important new content so that our anglers remain the best informed peacock fishermen in the world. Although we expect it to be a work in progress for quite some time, here are some of the new features.

Peacock Bass Species Directory - Although always subject to a fair amount of confusion and misunderstanding, peacock bass species identification was comparatively simple a few years ago when anglers only had to deal with five recognized species. In 2006, however, Dr. Sven Kullander and Dr. Efreim Ferreira redescribed the genus *Cichla*, adding 10 previously unnamed species of peacock bass to the angler's inventory. Now peacock ID has become a challenge even for taxonomists and museum curators!

We've **started** our new peacock bass species directory in an effort to provide anglers with clear and concise information about all of the current species and even some that may be added to the genus in the future. We're hoping to help clear up the confusion for fishermen ... with help from fishermen. We want to make this part of our website a web-community project. We've laid down the basic framework with data from scientific research and input from ichthyologists. Now, we're asking all of our website visitors with knowledge of these newly described species to help by contributing their photos, experiences and fishing tips to the pages as they evolve. Take a look, send us any info you may have, add your name to our list of contributors and help make accurate field identification of peacock bass feasible once again.

Peacock Bass Fishing Primer - Our instructive how-to and where-to guide for the peacock bass angler has been updated, enlarged and reformatted. New techniques and tactics have been added. Tackle recommendations have been updated and broadened to include a wide new array of modern lures. We plan

to continue to grow and update this feature of our site in order to enable our anglers to be prepared before they travel and to succeed when they arrive. Send us your suggestions, tips and experiences and we'll make them available to all of our visitors.

The Peacock Bass Rattle Jig - The most productive peacock bass lure in the Amazon has long remained a mystery to a great number of peacock bass anglers. We've added this detailed new section to make sure that the secret's out and to provide universal access to this easy to use fishing tool.

Peacock Bass Science - New material has been and will continue to be added to our science and conservation section. We believe that the more anglers know about their quarry, the better they are able to successfully pursue it and manage its conservation. Amazon river system related scientific articles and papers can help angler's to gain valuable insights and understanding of the peacock's life history and its amazing home waters.

Photos and Video - New video by Steve Townson, the 'Fish Finder', has been added to Acute Angling's website, as well as to "youtube.com". Our photo section is being updated to enable the use of "Gallery" a photo management system that will allow visitors to find and review hundreds of photos from our previous trips.

A New Look - Our site is written, compiled and maintained by us. We're anglers, not programmers, so our site has never looked particularly glitzy. No flash and dazzle here, since we just don't have the technical know-how to make it happen. What we do have, however, is the most useful and complete information about peacock bass available on the web today - a wealth of content. Although that's not about to change, we have changed the look of our site in an effort to make it more readable and more easily navigated. We've tried to make the pages cleaner and more intuitive. 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
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
